**Plots:** Our site is now fully let and we have 14 people on the waiting list awaiting a plot, I would like to welcome Angela (68b), Hugo (68a), Ricky (19A), Andrea (34), Angelina (64b), Sarah (98b), Paul (101), Patricia (103b) and their families to the site and wish them all well with their allotment plots.

**Main Gate** – Should be locked at all times except Sunday AM. There are other times when the gate does need to remain open – Deliveries to the Shop; Delivery of Machinery; Visitors to site. If this is the case there will be a notice on the gate asking for the gates to be left open – they will be closed once the delivery has finished. If there is no sign, please ensure that you lock the gate as you enter and leave the site. Recently, it has been noticed that the padlock has been left open. Having the gate locked makes the site secure and can be reassuring for some of the ladies working on site alone, knowing they are in a safe environment.

**Toilet Block** – We are very lucky to have a toilet block on site. Unfortunately, despite all the notices including the large banner that is now in the toilet block it continues to be misused. Please, Please DO NOT put anything other than toilet paper down the toilet. We continue to find that nappies etc are still being dropped down the pit. John has reported that disinfectant and t-rolls keep going missing from the Toilet Block. Please do not take any of the products from the toilet block.

The toilet block is in need of some essential maintenance. The floor needs painting and the structure needs treating. The boards to the pit also need replacing. The toilet block will need to be closed for a few days to allow this work to be completed. Eddy, John, Richard and Roy (committee members) will be carrying out this work and would like anybody who is able to offer some help with this maintenance to contact them so that a working party can be put together.

**Pathways:** When the cultivation survey was carried out it was noted that several paths are not being maintained. Please can I remind everyone that it is their responsibility to maintain the path to the right side of their plot in good order. Grass must be cut and the paths free of clutter to allow them to be used safely. Another cultivation Survey will be carried out again at the end of July 2021.

Hello to everyone from Sarah and Lawrence, a couple of newbies. We became custodians of plot 98b a few weeks ago and have been busy clearing the ground, constructing cages and supports, and getting crops into the soil. Things seem to have gone pretty well so far despite the somewhat extreme changes in weather conditions. Initially we developed nice sun tans but these seem to have morphed into rust patches as a result of all the rain.

Whilst working we did hope to dig up the odd rare coin, Roman sword or maybe a gold ring, but have been obliged to settle for a fine collection of stones and cable ties! Maybe we'll put them in a display cabinet in the shed. We have mostly used traditional stakes and netting to keep out the pesky birds and bugs but have strayed 'off piste' occasionally. For example, we have utilised auntie Cindy's old rotary washing line to help form a net cage. Luckily she had removed her 'smalls' beforehand.
