5.0	CHAIR'S REPORT	
	I have stated this before, but just would just like to reaffirm how fortunate we are in Bexley borough and more especially in Alers Road allotments, in not only being able to work and produce our own produce; with all the facilities at our disposal, but in comparison with boroughs elsewhere in the country how lucky we are in even having a piece of cultivated ground. Indeed, waiting lists vary around the country but are usually about seven years. Since 2011 the number of people waiting for plots in English local authorities has doubled from 86,787 to 174,183. So, I have reproduced here a recent Leader article from The Times.	
	Not so long ago, getting an allotment was a relatively swift and straightforward process. There are about 330,000 plots available to rent, usually at a low fee, in Britain. That is a drastic reduction from the 1.5 million under cultivation at the end of the First World War, but the delay between applying and digging, between form and fork if you will, was bearable. Now, as demand surges and supply shrinks ever further, a great deal of patience is required. Lucky gardeners arriving at the front of the queue all say it is worth the wait. Although the proximate causes of the rise in applications may be disagreeable — the exigencies of lockdowns, soaring food price inflation — more people wanting to grow their own food is a welcome side effect. Longer-term factors boosting demand include earlier and	

lengthier retirement, support for self-sufficiency shifting from the hippie fringe into the suburban mainstream (due respect goes to Tom and Barbara Good for pointing the way) and the rediscovery of old-fashioned wisdom that had been mislaid.

Connecting with nature, experiencing the rhythms of the seasons, working the soil, inhaling fresh air and nurturing fresh vegetables are all good not only for the body but for the soul. The mental health benefits of that humble yet deeply satisfying pastime best described as "pottering about" should not be underestimated.

Allotments also unite otherwise disparate individuals in a shared interest and purpose. They lessen social isolation and increase communal bonds. They offer the sanctuary of green space to those whose homes lack gardens. Their produce reduces the cost, both to the consumer and the environment, of much food to almost zero. No wonder so many people are keen to sign up. Allotment sites should be preserved and more land should be freed up for new ones.
